# A pintxo party

San Sebastián is a world-famous food destination - food is a celebration here, an art form. And there is no better way to taste what the gastronomical capital has to offer than by touring the pintxos bars of Old Town with Eskerne from **Discover San Sebastian** (discoversansebastian.com). Eskerne, or "Esky" as she tells us her Aussie clients often call her, is so knowledgeable and passionate about the history and food culture of San Sebastián – she is just pure joy!

Joe and I could have stayed with her all day, drinking Txakoli (the white wine of the region) and eating like locals. We visited five places and sampled everything from ham and beef cheek to a Basque delicacy, fish chin!

The area is also known for its cider, and we learned how to drink it as the locals do. Pouring the cider into a glass from a height at restaurant Bernardo Etxea was fun... if not a little messy!

Walking the buzzing cobblestone laneways with wafts of seafood and pungent spices filling the air, Eskerne tells us that for hundreds of years. gastronomy clubs have existed in San Sebastián. They were historically boys' clubs, where men would meet to cook and eat together, sharing their love of good food and wine. These clubs still exist. although many have relaxed the 'boys only' rule - not all - and are often

doors that you walk past in The Old Town, still filled with members eating, cooking and laughing together. The pintxos tour was unequivocally a highlight of our stay in San Sebastián, if not of our entire trip.
